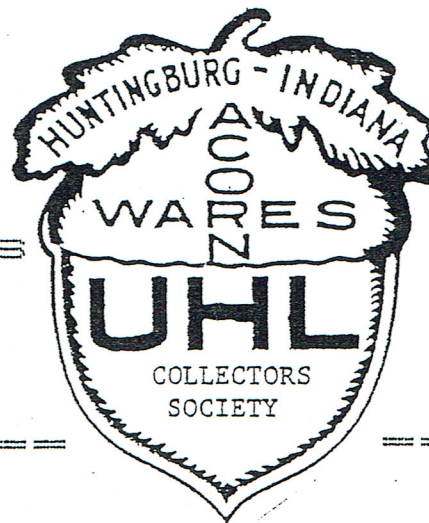

SUMMER GREETINGS:

For those of you that had so much fun and asked to have two conventions a year, the answer is NO! You may have had fun but for those putting it together they had to work for a year to make it so successful.

On Friday I arrived at the Holiday Inn at 10:00am. Yes it was early but soon after some of the first members started to check into the hotel. By 11:00 some boxes were being unpacked in the pool area and some money was exchanging hands. Around 1:00pm you would be able to go to several different rooms that had open doors and tables of UHL for sale. The entire hotel was a buzz by 4:00 with people everywhere. I saw a lot of members walking with bags and smiles on their faces. Must have been a good afternoon for shopping!!!

At 4:00pm members could go to the convention center and pick-up their packets which contained an agenda, membership roster, a copy of the by-laws, and a membership form. The form is for you to copy and give to anyone that may wish to join the club. Remember membership runs from January to December and we will remind you to renew in December.

Also from 4:00 - 6:00 was the sign-in for auction items. The auction was a great success. Starting at 7:30 and ending around 9:30 with 114 items selling. More later on the auction and prices with some pictures.

At 6:30 we were served a very good dinner with dessert. A total of 420 members were there for the meal. Fr. Erbacher was kind and said grace for us, with the meal being served promptly after.

After the auction was over everyone went room to room, shopping for that special piece to fit into their collection. Many items sold in the next three hours of excitement. I decided to go home around 12:00am but there still was a large number of members socializing until the wee hours of the morning.

6:00am came around quickly and it was time to get to the convention center. Members for the show and sale started to set up at 7:00am and I needed to get my picture taking in before the crowd arrived at 8:00. Later in the newsletter we will have pictures of as many tables as I can find room for.

The continental breakfast was served at 8:00am. By 9:00am you could hardly walk through the crowd. This was the largest room we have ever had before and the most members with many items for sale. If I had to guess I would venture to say that there were about 900 pieces of Uhl Pottery setting there for your looking pleasure.

At 9:00am the commemorative committee started to hand out this years very special piece. It was a handturned jar with the Evansville stamp on the front. We have had so many compliments on this piece that it may be hard to do better next year.

Also at 9:00am there was an "Is It Uhl?" seminar in the front of the room. Many new members had questions and had brought some pieces for the panel to discuss. Hopefully everyone recieved the answers they were looking for from the panel.

10:00am was the beginning of the meeting and it was the fastest meeting ever, only lasting about 15 minutes. Past president Steve Brundage started the meeting with a few words on how well everything went this year. He also thanked everyone involved by having them stand as their name was called.

The minutes from last years convention was read by secretary treasurer Tom Uebelhor and was excepted.

This year we needed to fill the position of Vice-President and a seat on the Board of Directors. There was only one nomination for each of these two positions. Don Schwartz was named Vice-President for a two year term, then moving to President for a two year term. Jim & Iris Allen took the seat on the Board of Directors for a three year term.

At this time President Steve Brundage stepped down and turned the convention over to the new President Dale Blann. Dale asked Steve Brundage, Ron & Pam Robbins, and Ralph Crouse to come forward and he presented them with a SPECIAL COMMEMORATIVE for the hard work they have all done over the past years. Everyone gave them a big round of applause for their commitment in making our club a big success.

The 1993 meeting was ended. This year because the club has grown so much the committee decided to give away about 54 extra commemoratives for members present. It was by draw of your membership number with the opportunity to purchase an extra jar.

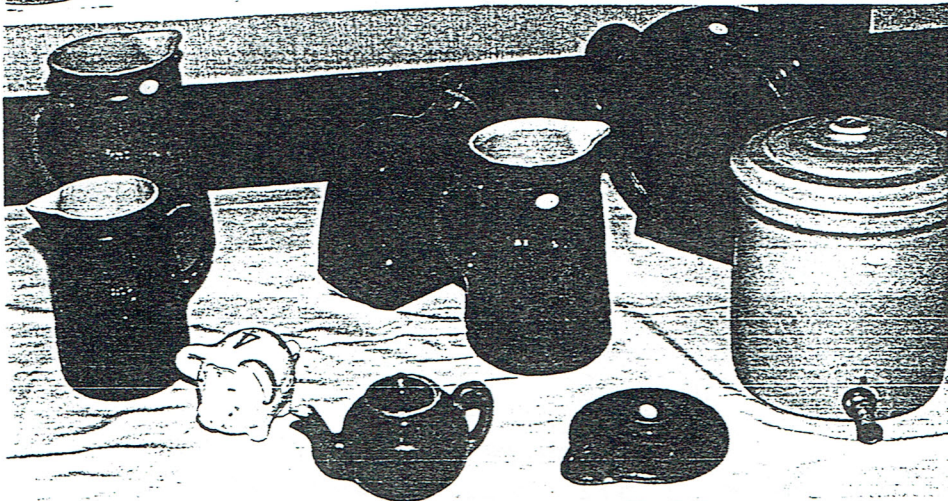

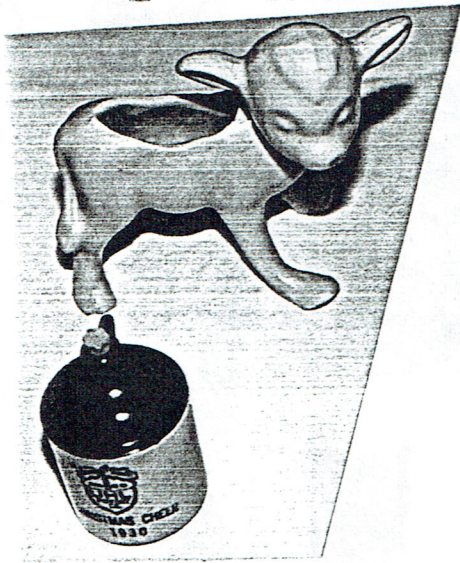

The following is from the "History of Vanderburgh County 1889 Prominent among the manufacturers of pottery and stoneware, which is one of the flourishing industries of Evansville, stands the firm of Bennighof, Uhl & Co. This partnership was formed in 1883, succeeding the Evansville Pottery company, which was established in 1879, really the date of the beginning of this manufacturing establishment. The firm manufactures stoneware exclusively, shipping the product west, and in 1887 the product reached the grand total of \$100,000, and eighty-six men were employed. August Uhl, a member of this firm, and a valuable citizen of Evansville, was born in Hesse Darmstadt, November 15, 1824. In his native land he received a good education, and learned the pottery business. After working there three years he came to the United States July 18, 1846, and after brief periods spent at New York, Pittsburgh and Louisville, came to Evansville in the spring of 1848, and here he has since resided. In 1849, he started in business for himself, with Henry Henn. This partnership lasted two years, and then Henn sold to Louis Daum. Three years later Mr. Uhl also sold out to Daum, and then he and his brother Louis were associated from 1854 to 1887, in the manufacture of stoneware.

The importance of this article is Bennighof, Uhl Co. which we some times see Bennighof on miniature jugs. Looks like these could very possibly be Uhl jugs. Also matching the jugs with other jugs of same shape, size, and color that have different addresses on them, maybe all made by Uhl in this early period.

Below Sue Maynard sent a photo of a jug she just purchased in California. This may be one of these jugs.

On the bottom in pencil was written B.A. Turner, B.R. Falls, Wisc 1901. The town is Black River Falls, Wi. Maybe the 1901 is when it was purchased there.
