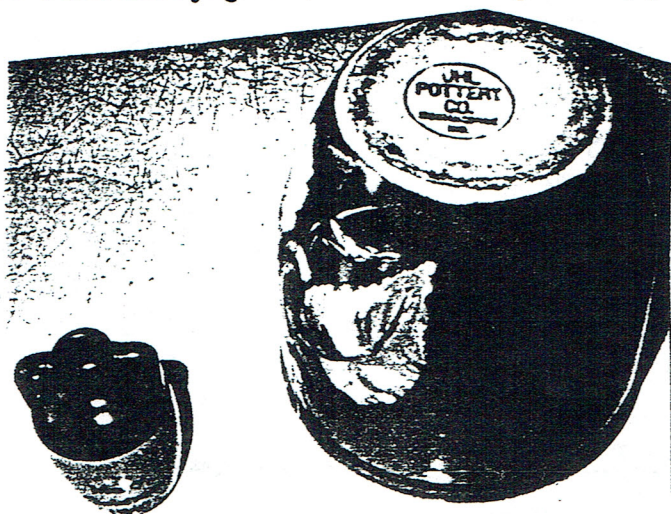

IN THE MAIL BAG

Dear Members:

Please read: (If you fill in a collection with reproductions, where will you be 25 years from now?) I am a member of the Uhl Collector's Society and this article says to join a club and insist that the club battle reproductions. Also to join the American Antique Association. I would like to know how you feel about this? As you well know it doesn't take much collecting of Uhl to get thousands of dollars tied up like myself and this article bugs me. It's my understanding that they are reproducing Uhl now. I love my collection of Uhl but I hate to think that it may be a bad investment down the road. My question is should we insist that the Uhl Collector's Society battle reproductions? I will look forward in hearing your reply in one of our upcoming newsletters. I know that our piece that I buy every year with the club goes up in value, But it's the other reproductions that I'm concerned about.

Recently a member of the American Antique Association's Advisory Board told me that he was no longer actively buying tin soldiers. He said the market had softened, reproductions were proliferating and many buyers had become cautious, even when

rarer than any 'Jones'."

Only two known originals! Does this mean that an owner of one of the two known originals is participating in this enterprise? If so, what is the original worth now that it has been knocked off?

"Far rarer;" what a misnomer. Not rare, but common is now the case. How would you like to be the owner of one of two known originals and find out that an exact duplicate was available for \$68.50?

Collectors are, as a group, one of the most honest, concerned and involved groups out there. They love their hobby, they study and try to become informed and in general they care. They have one shortcoming, they are, in my opinion, naive about the forces focused on ripping them off.

The people producing reproductions are not concerned about the long or short term effects of their actions. They are out to make money. Plain and simple. Go ahead and "fill in" your collection with reproductions. What kind of value do you think you will have in 25 years? Probably none. In fact, the repros that have "filled in" the holes of a collection in 25 years will make the entire collection suspect. Think about the entire field. Will it hold any interest to anyone years down the road as these reproductions start looking older?

All over the world there are organizations producing products designed to look old in order to fool collectors. These are not small-time operations. They are well financed, international and national operations that

want your money.

The question always comes up, "What can I do to protect myself." Try these.

- Join The American Antique Association.
- Join a Collectors Club. Insist that the club battle reproductions.
- Do not let sellers of reproductions set up at your shows.
- Get a written receipt which should include approximate age, condition and the name and address of the seller.
- Insist on a money-back guarantee.

If you are concerned about the rising tide of unmarked reproductions that are threatening the antiques and collectibles industry please, join with us and help in the battle to fight back.

dealing with established, reputable dealers. To illustrate his point he showed me a near mint set of figures which were purchased from a private source and actually old. He had offered this set at several shows and in his shop for more than a year. No takers. Numerous comments such as "must be a repro" etc. were heard.

My immediate reaction was "another endangered species" to add to our growing list. Sad, but nothing new.

He then handed me about nine pages copied from a recent catalog of reproduction soldiers. Although the catalog itself was poorly produced the content was sickening. Dozens of reproductions, many of hard-to-get figures were depicted. The prices were cheap compared to what an original is worth.

No wonder people are suspicious. The apparent thrust of the catalog was, these are my words not theirs, "buy our reproductions and fill in those hard (and expensive) pieces missing from your collection."

To illustrate my point let me quote from the catalog. "The Sacrifice: Special figure of wounded Doughboy .. \$68.50 Only 2 known original figures ... Beautiful detail. Far
