### Order of eligibilty:

1. Paid up members as of April 1, 1987
2. Members joining after April 1, 1987 and before June 20, 1987. Order to be determined by postmark.
3. Members joining at meeting. Order to be determined by registration time.

Members in good standing have until 1:00 P.M. on date of meeting to claim their commemorative. From 1:00 to 2:00 new members may pick up their item according to forementioned registration time. Any remaining after 2:00 P.M. June 20, 1987 will be disposed of according to the vote of the members in the previous morning meeting. No items will be mailed until after the 20th. If you are not able to attend the meeting and want to be assured a commemorative, be sure to get your order in as soon as you can. The order blank will be in the April newsletter. Cost is not verified yet.

The man writing the book on UHL is Earl McCurdy of Evansville. We hope to have him at our show with books to sell to us but right now "hope" is as far as our plans have moved along.

It isn't too early to be thinking about your plans for the show. Will you plan to have a table to display and/or sell excess UHL items? Do you have a piece that needs to be identified?
