

Another Curran Miller Auction had a mini globe jug that was painted brown and found in the bottom of a box. With a little help from all the potential buyers some of the paint was scratched off to reveal some numbers. After the jug was purchased for \$175 it was taken home by the buyer and the old paint was stripped off and a perfect 1937 Christmas jug was revealed.

Recently an unmarked tank bank sold for \$550.

1in mini jug with advertising "Illinoian State Fair" \$175.
#529 blue casserole stamped \$65.

Another auction a 20gal Evansville jar brought \$140.
#167 flat sided rabbit planter in dark rose sold for \$135.
#167 flat sided rabbit planter in peach sold for \$65.
5gal shoulder jug sold for \$55.

Mike & Monica Atkins recently purchased a 3gal preserve jar with the acorn stamp on the front.

I have a request to find out how many sizes of Creme De Coffee jugs that were made by UHL and the numbers of those jugs. My #164 jug holds 20 oz also I have one that holds 10 oz but no number that is legible on the bottom. The Uhl catalog #15 shows a 25 oz jug. Can anyone help with sizes and numbers please. Is there three sizes or only two?

Mark Coleman purchased a blue #29 mini pitcher at a flea market in his area for \$1.25. He said that before Uhler's start heading his way in mass it was the first piece of UHL that he has seen at this flea market in 6 trips.





The first egg beater jar was purchased recently by Jerry Couturiaux at an auction for a \$1 steal.




The picture at right is yard pottery that is used and displayed very nicely at Lee & Dan Hadley's home.
